I feel humbled to present the Annual Report of the Delhi University Library System (DULS) for the year 2024–2025. This report highlights our continuing efforts to evolve as a dynamic and responsive academic support system aligned with the growing demands of digital scholarship and knowledge dissemination at the University of Delhi.

Over the past years, DULS has taken significant strides in transforming its services and infrastructure to meet the changing needs of students, researchers, and faculty members. The addition of human resources to the posts of Deputy Librarian and Assistant Librarian has been the key step in this direction. The expansion of the Central Library Complex building is underway to accommodate more users and initiate new library services.

Our DU eLibrary Portal has continued to provide remote access, ensuring uninterrupted academic access to our users and acting as a central access point for a wide array of digital resources, including e-journals, databases, e-books, etc. Being one of the oldest academic library systems, DULS is committed to look ahead on the path to carry out the Viksit Bharat@2047 vision of our Hon'ble Prime Minister by supporting its three significant pillars: Youth, Underprivileged & Women Patrons. DULS is also accomplishing the needs of New Education Policy (NEP) and in this context One Nation One Subscription (ONOS) Phase- I is very benevolent.

DULS is focusing on open source software to provide cost-effective, technologically driven advanced services and facilities. In support of scholarly publishing and open access, DULS has initiated the Delhi University Publishing by rolling out the Open Journal System (OJS) - a significant step towards empowering departments, research centres, and constituent colleges to publish scholarly journals in a streamlined and professional manner to enhance the global visibility, citations and impact of the University of Delhi research output. DULS has adopted and transited on Koha - an open-source Integrated Library Management Software, to provide advanced services to its patrons. This transition represents a major leap in standardizing, automating, and integrating library operations across DULS.

These initiatives reflect our commitment to embracing innovation, promoting open access, and creating an efficient and inclusive library ecosystem. I take this opportunity to express my gratitude to our Hon'ble Vice Chancellor, Prof. Yogesh Singh, for putting his trust and providing guidance and full support to the DULS.

I would like to express my sincere thanks to the entire library staff for their valuable input and support in the preparation of this report.

As we navigate the evolving landscape of academic libraries, DULS remains committed to excellence, collaboration, and digital empowerment to serve the educational mission of the University of Delhi.

## कार्यकारी सारांश

दिल्ली विश्वविद्यालय पुस्तकालय मण्डल (डीयूएलएस) ने वित्तीय वर्ष 2024-2025 में विश्वविद्यालय के शैक्षणिक एवं शोध लक्ष्यों को दृष्टिगत रखते हुए अपने पाठ्य सामग्रियों, डिजिटल संसाधनों और पाठक केन्द्रित नवीनतम शोध सेवाओं का विस्तार करना जारी रखा है। मुद्रित और डिजिटल पाठ्य सामग्रियों के संग्रह को सुदृढ़ बनाने के निरंतर प्रयासों के साथ 9,755 नए मुद्रित संस्करणों को जोड़ा गया, जिससे 31 मार्च 2025 तक कुल मुद्रित पाठ्य सामग्रियों की कुल संख्या 17,35,082 हो गई है। इसी क्रम में, डिजिटल संसाधनों का विस्तार भी महत्वपूर्ण रहा, जिसमें 59,186 नई इलेक्ट्रॉनिक पुस्तकों का क्रय किया गया, जिसमें 1,481 निःशुल्क पुस्तकें और 27 डिजिटल आर्काइव्स भी सम्मिलित हैं। इलेक्ट्रॉनिक पुस्तकों का संग्रह पिछले वर्ष के सापेक्ष में 143,838 से बढ़कर 204,505 और डिजिटल अभिलेखागार 17 से बढ़कर 44 हो गया। इसके अतिरिक्त पुस्तकालय मण्डल ने बहु-विषयी शोध हेतु उपयोगी 43 महत्वपूर्ण अकादमिक/शैक्षणिक डेटाबेसों का अधिगम विश्वविद्यालय के दोनों परिसरों और घटक महाविद्यालयों में सुनिश्चित की। साथ ही, 531 मुद्रित आवधिक पत्रिकाओं और 87 इलेक्ट्रॉनिक जर्नल्स की सदस्यता भी ली गई जिससे विभिन्न विषयों में अद्यतन अनुसंधान सम्बन्धित कार्य निर्बंध रूप से जारी रह सके। अपने अकादमिक आधार को और भी अधिक सुदृढ़ बनाते हुए, दिल्ली विश्वविद्यालय पुस्तकालय मण्डल ने 27,994 शोध प्रबंधों और 22,152 शोध निबंधों का अधिगम भी पाठकों तक सुनिश्चित की, साथ ही, अपने संग्रह में कुल 4,27,509 बाउंड वॉल्यूम जर्नल्स का व्यापक संग्रह भी सुरक्षित किया है। पुस्तकालय में 702 बहुभाषी पांडुलिपियाँ और दुर्लभ पुस्तकों के 279 संग्रह भी हैं, जो पाठकों की दुर्लभ और मूल्यवान शैक्षणिक सामग्रियों तक व्यापक पहुंच प्रदान करते हैं। ब्रेल पुस्तकालय सुलभ प्रारूपों में पाठ्य-सामग्री प्रदान कर दिव्यांगजनों के सामाजिक समावेश में महत्वपूर्ण भूमिका निभा रहा है। ये संसाधन विश्वविद्यालय की अनुसंधान क्षमताओं और ज्ञान के प्रसार के लिए विभिन्न प्रारूपों में उपलब्ध कराये गए पाठ्य सामग्रियों हेतु हमारे अनवरत प्रयासों को दर्शाते हैं।

रिपोर्ट अवधि के दौरान पुस्तकालय मण्डल के अधीनस्थ विभिन्न पुस्तकालयों में कुल 7,25,443 पाठकों ने उपस्थिति दर्ज करायी। कुल 3,21,473 पुस्तकों का परिचालन हुआ तथा पाठकों द्वारा 4,96,620 दस्तावेजों से परामर्श प्राप्त किया गया। पुस्तकालयों ने सामूहिक रूप से छात्रों, शोधकर्ताओं और शिक्षकों सहित 23,501 पाठकों की पुस्तकालय सदस्यता का पंजीकरण किया। केंद्रीय पुस्तकालय 164,682 पाठकों के उपस्थिति के साथ पहले स्थान पर रहा, इसके बाद 92,253 पाठकों के उपस्थिति के साथ दक्षिणी दिल्ली परिसर दूसरे, 56,000 पाठकों के उपस्थिति के साथ केन्द्रीय विज्ञान पुस्तकालय तीसरे, और 49,521 पाठकों के उपस्थिति के साथ रतन टाटा पुस्तकालय का चतुर्थ स्थान रहा। इसके अलावा, विधि संकाय के पुस्तकालय ने भी पाठकों से पुस्तकालय सम्बंधित 65,000 विभिन्न परामर्श दर्ज किया। पुस्तकालय मण्डल के अधीनस्थ अन्य विभागीय पुस्तकालयों ने भी उल्लेखनीय एवं सक्रिय उपस्थिति दर्ज की एनसीडब्ल्यूईबी पुस्तकालय ने भी अकादमिक सहायता प्रदान करने के लिए केंद्रीयकृत संसाधनों का उपयोग करना जारी रखा।

इलेक्ट्रॉनिक संसाधनों की जागरूकता और उपयोग बढ़ाने हेतु दिल्ली विश्वविद्यालय पुस्तकालय मण्डल ने संपादकों और प्रशिक्षकों के सहयोग से क्षमता विकास के लिए कई प्रशिक्षण कार्यक्रम, वेबिनार आयोजित किये, जिसके परिणामस्वरूप इन संसाधनों के उपयोग में उत्साहवर्द्धक वृद्धि दर्ज की गयी है। डिजिटल साक्षरता और पाठकों के बीच अकादमिक प्रकाशन के कौशल को बढ़ावा देने के उद्देश्य से पुस्तकालय समूह के सदस्यों के नेतृत्व में कई कार्यशालाएं और प्रसार कार्यक्रम भी आयोजित किये गये, जो अत्यंत प्रभावी रहे।

दिल्ली विश्वविद्यालय मण्डल, समावेशी पहुंच, डिजिटल नवाचार और अकादमिक प्रसार आधारित भविष्य की कल्पना करता है, उसी क्रम में, पुस्तकालय सुविधाओं के बुनियादी ढांचे में सुधार करने, संसाधनों की अधिक विविधता के लिए संपादकों के साथ सहयोग को सुदृढ़ करने और विश्वविद्यालय समुदाय के विकास हेतु मोबाइल आधारित विकल्पों को अपनाने की योजना बनाई जा रही है। दिल्ली विश्वविद्यालय पुस्तकालय मण्डल उत्कृष्टता, अनुकूलनशीलता और सेवा के लिए प्रतिबद्ध होने के साथ-साथ दिल्ली विश्वविद्यालय के शैक्षणिक और अनुसंधान परिदृश्य को आगे बढ़ाने में एक मौलिक स्तंभ के रूप में अपनी भूमिका सदैव निभाता रहेगा।

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Delhi University Library System (DULS) has continued to expand its reach, resources, and relevance to support the University's scholarly mission during the financial year 2024–2025. With sustained efforts towards enhancing print and digital collections, DULS added 9,755 new print volumes, taking the total print volumes to 17,35,082 as on March 31, 2025. Parallel to this, digital expansion of resources was also significant- with the acquisition of 59,186 new e-books, including 1,481 complimentary titles and 27 Digital Archives. The e-book collection grew to 2,04,505 from last year's 1,43,838 and Digital Archives from 17 to 44. In addition, the DULS maintained access to 43 vital academic databases supporting interdisciplinary research across both the campuses and constituent colleges. Subscription to 531 periodicals in print format and 87 individual e-journals continued to support current awareness and scholarly productivity across disciplines. Further, reinforcing its academic backbone, DULS endorses the accessibility of 27,994 theses and 22,152 dissertations and maintains an extensive archive of 4,27,509 bound periodicals. DULS also has 702 multilingual manuscripts and 279 rare book collections, providing broader access to rare and valuable academic materials. The Braille Library is playing a significant role in social inclusion of Divyangjan by making provisions of reading materials in accessible formats. These resources underpin the University's research capabilities and knowledge dissemination framework.

User engagement metrics remained robust, with 7,25,443 physical visits recorded across various libraries within the University. Circulation and consultation services also demonstrated high usage, with 3,21,473 documents issued and 4,96,620 materials consulted on-site. The libraries collectively supported a registered membership of 23,501 users, including students, research scholars, and faculty members. The Central Library is in the leading position with a footfall of 1,64,682 visitors, followed by South Delhi Campus Library with 92,253 visitors; CSL with 56,000; and RTL with 49,521 visitors. In addition to this, the Law Faculty Library, with its well-curated collection, recorded 65,000 consultations. Several departmental libraries also recorded a marked growth and active usage. Notably, the NCWEB Library, serving over 33,000 students across 27 centres, continued to leverage centralized resources to deliver equitable academic support in collaboration with DULS.

DULS also carried out numerous training programs, webinars, and capacity-building initiatives in collaboration with publishers and internal stakeholders to boost awareness and utilization of e-resources which has resulted in increased usage of these resources. DULS team member-led workshops and strategic outreach programs complemented the user-focused events to foster digital literacy and scholarly publishing skills among users.

DULS envisions a future anchored in inclusive access, digital innovation, and strategic partnerships. Plans are underway to enhance infrastructure with smart facilities, deepen publisher collaborations for greater resource diversity, and introduce mobile-access solutions to accommodate the evolving learning habits of the University community. By staying committed to excellence, adaptability, and service, DULS will continue to uphold its role as a foundational pillar in advancing the University of Delhi's academic and research landscape.

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# 1. Introduction

## 1.1 About DULS

The Delhi University Library System (DULS) began its journey in 1922 with a modest collection of 1,380 gifted books and 86 current periodicals. In its early years, the library operated from various locations, reflecting the university's shifting premises. By 1933, it found a more stable home in the Ballroom of the Old Vice-Regal Lodge, now the Vice-Chancellor's office. This relocation was made possible through a generous donation from Shri G.D. Birla, which facilitated necessary renovations. Notably, sixteen exquisite Burma teak cases were acquired from Viceroy Lord Linlithgow and the Wardens and Fellows of All Souls College, Oxford, enhancing the library's aesthetic and functional appeal.

A significant milestone was achieved on December 1, 1958, when the current Central Library building was inaugurated by Dr. S. Radhakrishnan, the then Chancellor and President of India. The foundation stone for this building had been laid four years earlier by Vice-Chancellor Dr. G.S. Mahajani.

The library's growth was significantly influenced by key figures such as Sir Maurice Gwyer, Vice-Chancellor from 1938 to 1950, who played a pivotal role in its development. Additionally, Dr. S.R. Ranganathan, renowned as the father of the modern Library Science movement in India, and Professor S. Das Gupta, the first Librarian (1942-1966), were instrumental in the library's continuous advancement.

The 1960s marked a period of expansion, with the establishment of departmental libraries across various faculties, including Arts, Mathematics, Social Sciences, Science, and Management Studies. This era also saw the creation of specialized libraries such as the Ratan Tata Library for Economics and the Central Science Library. In 1982, the Arts Library was established, further decentralizing the library system to better cater to specific academic needs.

Under the leadership of Dr. Rajesh Singh, University Librarian, the library system has embraced modernization of services and digitization of resources. His vision has focused on expanding digital resources, implementing user-centric services, and developing infrastructure that aligns with global best practices in academic librarianship. His efforts have been strongly supported by the Hon'ble **Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Yogesh Singh**, who has consistently encouraged initiatives aimed at academic excellence, infrastructure enhancement, and research support across the university's libraries. Today, DULS encompasses over 34 libraries, serving as a comprehensive resource hub for the university's diverse academic community.

We are the knowledge hub of the University of Delhi — a dynamic and integrated library network comprising over 34 libraries that support the university's diverse academic and research community. Delhi University Library System (DULS) has grown into a premier academic resource hub, offering rich collections, modern digital services, and user-friendly spaces that foster learning, innovation, and research. ### Vision

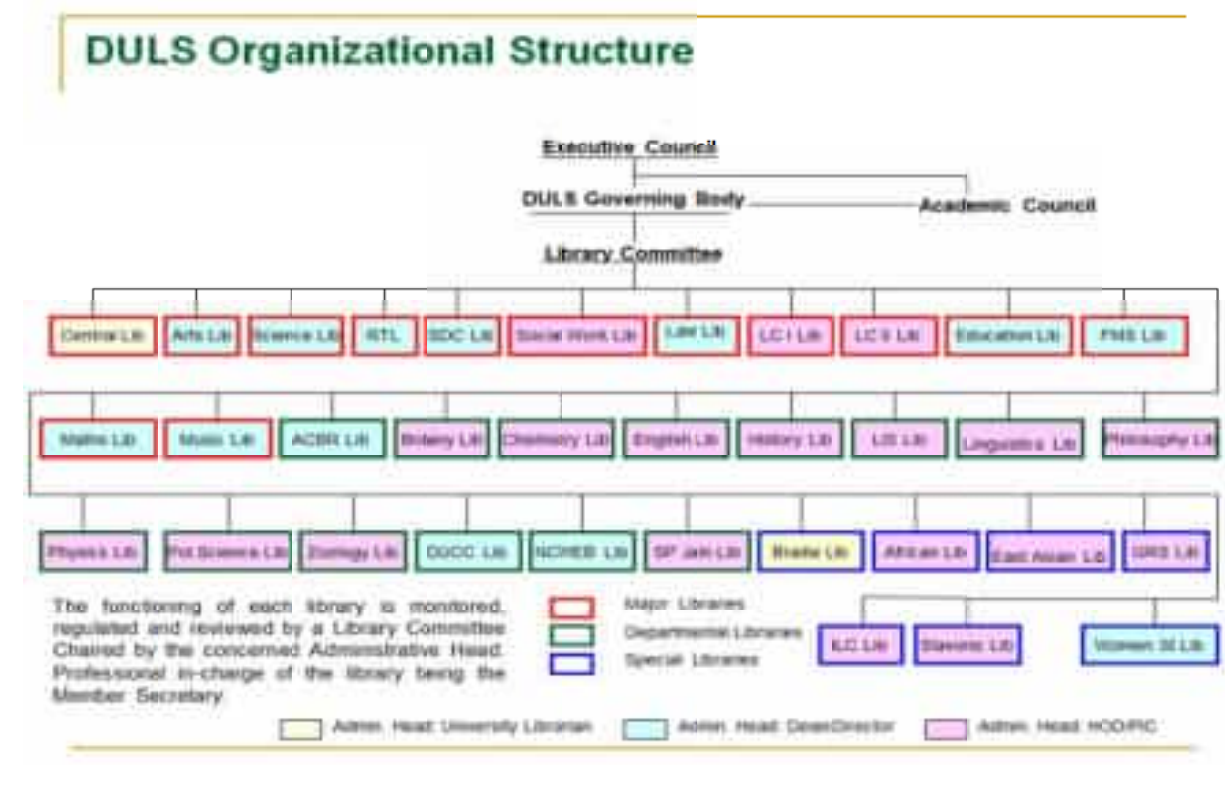

#### Multidisciplinary Major Libraries

##### Central Library Complex (including Arts Library), North Campus

The Central Library serves as the flagship resource centre of the Delhi University Library System, offering a vast collection of multidisciplinary academic and research materials. Located within the Central Library Complex, it supports teaching, learning, and research across all faculties. With enhanced digital infrastructure and access to online databases, it remains a cornerstone of academic excellence in the University.

The Arts Library provides specialized support to the humanities and social science departments, hosting a wide array of reference works, journals, and subject-specific literature. Situated in the Central Library Complex, it facilitates faculty, student and researchers by offering services that include reading rooms, lending, access to e-resources etc..

##### Central Science Library, Faculty of Science, North Campus

The Central Science Library supports the academic needs of science departments by maintaining an extensive collection of textbooks, journals, and research materials in various scientific disciplines. Its user-friendly services and modern digital access points make it an essential resource for researchers, faculty, and students in the sciences.

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**Ratan Tata Library, Delhi School of Economics, North Campus**

Ratan Tata Library is a premier facility dedicated to Economics, Commerce, Geography, Sociology and related disciplines. Located within the Delhi School of Economics, it houses rare collections, statistical databases, and high-impact journals. The library plays a vital role in supporting advanced research and postgraduate studies in social sciences.

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**South Campus Library, University of Delhi, South Campus**

The South Campus Library serves as a central academic hub for the departments located in South Campus, providing access to books, journals, and digital resources across a range of subjects. With ongoing efforts to modernize its infrastructure and expand collections, the library ensures continuous support for research and teaching.

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**Single Discipline Major Libraries**

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**Department of Social Work Library, North Campus**

This library caters specifically to the academic and practical needs of Social Work students and faculty. It maintains an interdisciplinary collection of textbooks, periodicals, supporting field-based research and interdisciplinary study.

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**Law Faculty Library, Faculty of Law, North Campus**

The Law Faculty Library is a key legal resource centre, offering authoritative texts, case law reports, statutes, and International Law resources. It supports undergraduate, postgraduate and research scholars for legal education. It is a hub for academic discourse and legal research.

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**Law Centre-I Library, Faculty of Law, North Campus**

The Law Centre-I Library provides essential support to students enrolled in under graduate legal programs, with a strong collection of legal literature, journals, and reference materials. The library fosters a research-oriented environment, conducive to legal scholarship for LLB.

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**Law Centre-II Library, Faculty of Law, North Campus**

Focused on providing academic and professional legal resources, the Law Centre-II Library serves the specific curriculum and research needs of its students. With access to major Law Databases and print collections, it enhances legal studies and practice for under graduates.

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**Integrated Law Course Library (ILC), Faculty of Law, North Campus**

The ILC Library is dedicated to the unique needs of students pursuing the Integrated Law program BA LLB & BBA LLB. It supports foundational legal education through well-curated resources, fostering analytical and research skills in aspiring legal professionals.

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**Faculty of Education Library, North Campus**

The Faculty of Education Library is a specialized resource centre for education and teacher training. It caters to the academic and research needs of students, faculty, and researchers in the field of Education, boasting an extensive collection of books, journals, dissertations, and other educational materials.

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**Faculty of Management Studies Library, North Campus**

The FMS Library plays a pivotal role in business and management education by offering resources in Strategic Management, Marketing, Finance, and Organizational Behaviour. With rich print and

electronic collections, it supports the academic rigour of one of India's premier management institutions.

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**Faculty of Mathematical Sciences Library, North Campus**

This library supports the academic and research needs of students and faculty in Mathematics and related fields. It features collection related to Mathematical Sciences.

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**Faculty of Music Library, North Campus**

Established in 1962, the Music Department Library is a specialized facility designed to support music students and researchers, boasting a rich collection of books and audio-video materials. The library also includes Braille Section, which caters to visually challenged students with resources like talking books in CD format, Braille-script books, and computers designated for their use. Additionally, the library features a Listening Room, an extension of the Audio-Video library, where students can engage with audio content using CD players equipped with headphones.

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**Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar Centre for Biomedical Research Library, North Campus**

Dedicated to Biomedical Sciences, this library provides cutting-edge research material, scientific journals, and reference literature to students and researchers. It supports interdisciplinary research in Life Sciences and Biotechnology.

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**Department of Botany Library, Faculty of Science, North Campus**

The Botany Library supports the academic and research needs of students and faculty in plant sciences. It features collections in Taxonomy, Ecology, Plant Physiology, and recent advancements in botanical research.

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**Department of Chemistry Library, Faculty of Science, North Campus**

This departmental library offers a robust collection in Organic, Inorganic, Physical, and Analytical Chemistry. It supports laboratory research, academic coursework, and innovation in Chemical Sciences.

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**Department of English Library, Faculty of Arts, North Campus**

The English Department Library is rich in Classical and Contemporary Literature, Literary Theory, and criticism. It caters to students and research scholars, promoting literary scholarship and critical inquiry.

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**Department of History Library, Faculty of Social Sciences, North Campus**

Housing a wide range of historical texts, journals, and primary sources, the History Library supports academic programs in Ancient, Medieval, and Modern History. It plays a vital role in facilitating archival and field-based research.

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**Department of Library and Information Science Library, North Campus**

This library supports the study and practice of Library Science, including Knowledge Organization, Information systems, and Digital Librarianship. It is an important resource for students preparing to enter the Library profession.

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**Department of Linguistics Library, Faculty of Arts, North Campus**

The Linguistics Library offers resources in theoretical and applied Linguistics, Phonetics, Syntax, and Sociolinguistics. It supports both language research and the interdisciplinary applications of linguistics.

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**Department of Philosophy Library, Faculty of Arts, North Campus**

This library supports academic inquiry into Indian and Western Philosophy. It features works on Logic, Metaphysics, Ethics, and Contemporary Philosophical debates, serving as a core resource for philosophy students and researchers.

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**Department of Physics and Astrophysics Library, Faculty of Science, North Campus**

This library maintains comprehensive resources in Classical Physics, Quantum Mechanics, and Astrophysics. It supports experimental and theoretical research, contributing significantly to scientific advancement.

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**Department of Political Science Library, Faculty of Social Sciences, North Campus**

The Political Science Library offers books and journals covering Political Theory, International Relations, and Public Administration. It supports teaching and research in Contemporary Political studies.

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**Department of Zoology Library, Faculty of Science, North Campus**

Supporting research and academics in Animal Biology, this library houses extensive material in Genetics, Ecology, Physiology, and Zoological classification. It is crucial to the department's ongoing scientific inquiry

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**Delhi University Computer Centre Library, Faculty of Science, North Campus**

This library offers IT and computer science resources, including Programming Manuals, Software Engineering Literature, and Databases. It supports both coursework and applied research in Computing.

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**Non-Collegiate Women's Education Board Library, North Campus**

Designed to support the academic needs of non-collegiate female students, this library offers a user-friendly collection of textbooks, guides, and exam preparation materials in multiple disciplines.

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**S.P. Jain Research Centre Library, Department of Financial Studies, South Campus**

The S.P. Jain Research Centre Library is focused on Finance, Investment, and Business Research. With access to high-end financial databases and research publications, it supports M.Fin. and Ph.D. scholars in advanced study and Financial Analysis.

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**Braille Library, Central Library Complex, North Campus**

Established in 1976, the Braille Library serves visually impaired users with audio, braille, and digital materials. It features soundproof studios, a Braille Embosser, reading room, editing suite, and high-speed scanners. Its transformation in 2013 enabled digital accessibility through e-texts and e-pubs, supporting inclusive education.

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**Department of African Studies Library, Faculty of Social Science, North Campus**

Specializing in African Studies, this library offers around 4,000 resources on Africa's History, Politics, Culture, and Diaspora. The library caters to students and scholars with both print and digital academic materials.

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**Department of East Asian Studies Library, Faculty of Social Sciences, North Campus**

Founded in 1967, this library supports interdisciplinary studies in Chinese, Japanese, and Korean Languages and Cultures. It provides print and digital resources, a language lab, and access to global databases. The department also facilitates international scholarships and emphasizes information literacy and open-access research.

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**Department of Germanic and Romance Studies Library, Faculty of Arts, North Campus**

Named after poet Pablo Neruda, this library holds over 37,000 volumes on European languages, literature, and culture. Established in 1948, it serves both departmental and cross-disciplinary scholars. Its collection is enriched through academic exchanges and donations from institutions in Europe and beyond.

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**Department of Slavonic and Finno-Ugrian Studies Library, Faculty of Arts, North Campus**

The SFUS library is part of the Department of Slavonic and Finno-Ugrian Studies provides full-time and part-time programs across various languages from the Slavonic and Finno-Ugric families, such as Russian, Bulgarian, Croatian, Czech, Polish, and Hungarian.

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**Women's Studies & Development Centre Library, Academic Research Centre, North Campus**

WSDC Library supports pioneering research in Gender and Women's studies. It plays a vital role in Feminist Academic Discourse and Policy Studies.

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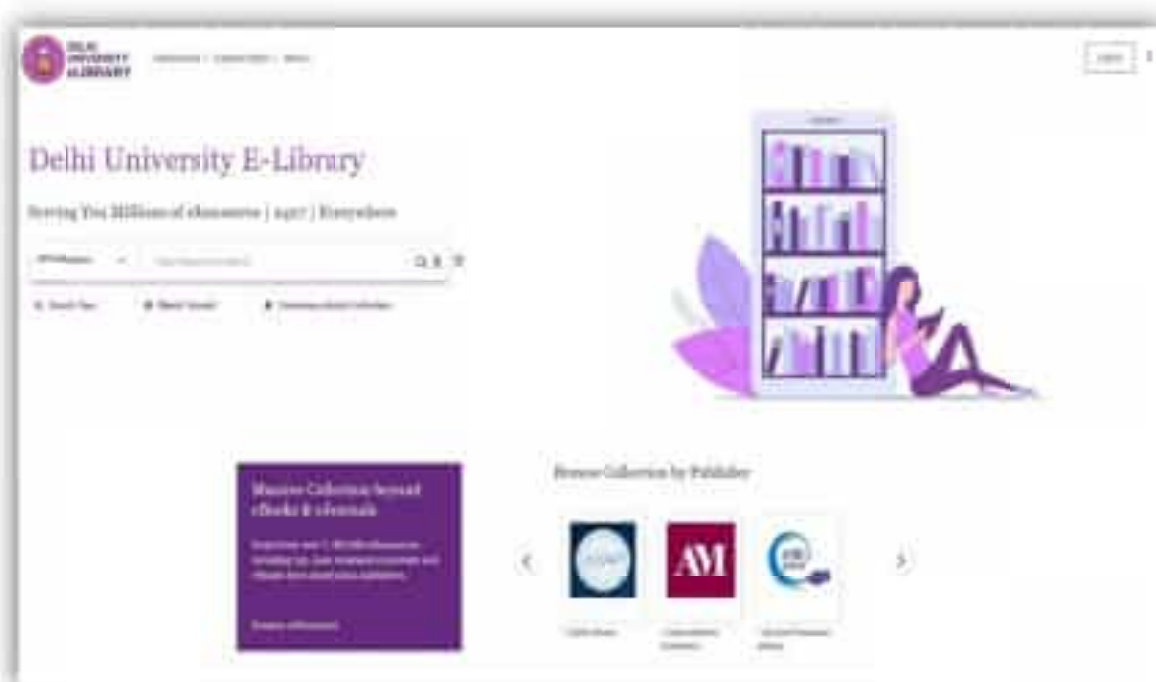
#### **4.1.1 DU eLibrary Portal**

- Purpose: Centralized gateway to all digital academic resources and services

The DU eLibrary a well-equipped remote access platform, enables its users to access an extensive collection of subscribed electronic resources as well as open access resources and resources covered under **ONOS** anytime, anywhere. With DU eLibrary platform several resources from different disciplines are available and in order to make them more user-friendly, it categorizes e-resources by publisher, discipline and format. The DU eLibrary facility is also available via Mobile Apps on both android and iOS.

The DU eLibrary serves as a common gateway to:

- 2,04,505 e-books and 43 databases from top-rated national and international publishers, including Wiley, Elsevier, Sage, DeGrutyer, Cambridge University Press (CUP), Oxford University (OUP), and many more reputable and open access publishing platforms.
- 87 Individual e-journals from the most renowned publishers like SpringerLink, Taylor and Francis, American Chemical Society, Institute of Physics, OUP, CUP, Sage, DeGrutyer, and more.
- E-theses & dissertations from more than 1000 universities in India and abroad. Video lectures from IITs, NITs, ISB, foreign universities like MIT, Harvard, Yale, and UCI, as well as many publisher's broadcast channels like the Royal Society of Chemistry and Ted-ED.
- Press Readers Online service which provides newspapers and magazines in different languages of various regions at national and international level.
- Expert talks and literary works in English, Hindi, Urdu, and other languages for leisure reading.
- A single sign on discovery feature is also available for its user to access all resources easily.
- The “Reading List” feature is also tailored to save content for future reference.
- A unique feature of "Socio Lib" is also provided to follow peers.

The official website of DULS has been revamped using a modern Content Management System, Drupal 11. It is the latest version, which is more flexible, with high scalability, and a strong security architecture. This upgrade enables a more user-friendly interface with proper visibility, streamlined content updates, and integration with other DULS digital resources. With 500 GB dedicated storage, the new website supports dynamic content delivery, multimedia integration, compatibility, and accessibility features, aligning with global best practices in web design. All major libraries under the DULS have their respective websites based on the same platform. The design also incorporates single directory components for faster theming and maintenance. The library website notifies of any upcoming events organised by the library regarding training of electronic resources, research workshops, and others. The website is also integrated with a Chatbot service, where users can ask any query related to the library.



### 4.1.3 Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) of All Major Libraries Under DULS

DULS has centralized the catalogues of all its major libraries under one platform using Koha 24.05.00, an advanced open source Integrated Library Management System (ILMS). The platform offers a unified web-based Online Public Access Catalogue (Web-OPAC), enabling users to perform multi-lingual searches across the entire DULS collection seamlessly. The implementation of Koha enhances transparency, ease of access, and effective & efficient resource sharing among libraries. Web-OPAC search result provides a URL to access the e-books procured by the DULS, by directing to the publisher's website. Additionally, the system supports real-time availability status, automated circulation services, and enriched bibliographic records, ensuring an intuitive and comprehensive discovery experience for all users. The OPAC webpage provides a separate button to directly get the collection of different languages with one click. This web page also provides a direct link to DU eLibrary and several other useful links.

Through this initiative, the university provides robust technical and editorial support to in-house (university-affiliated) academic journals across disciplines, thereby increasing their visibility, accessibility, and academic credibility. OJS 3.4 offers a user-friendly, modular, and flexible interface that accommodates the full spectrum of scholarly publishing from manuscript submission and peer review to copyediting, production, and publication. It ensures academic integrity and author identity verification, aligning with global best practices. By leveraging the full capabilities of OJS 3.4, the Delhi University Publishing Initiative is not only modernizing the academic publishing process but also reinforcing its role as a catalyst for knowledge dissemination, open scholarship, and academic excellence in India and beyond.

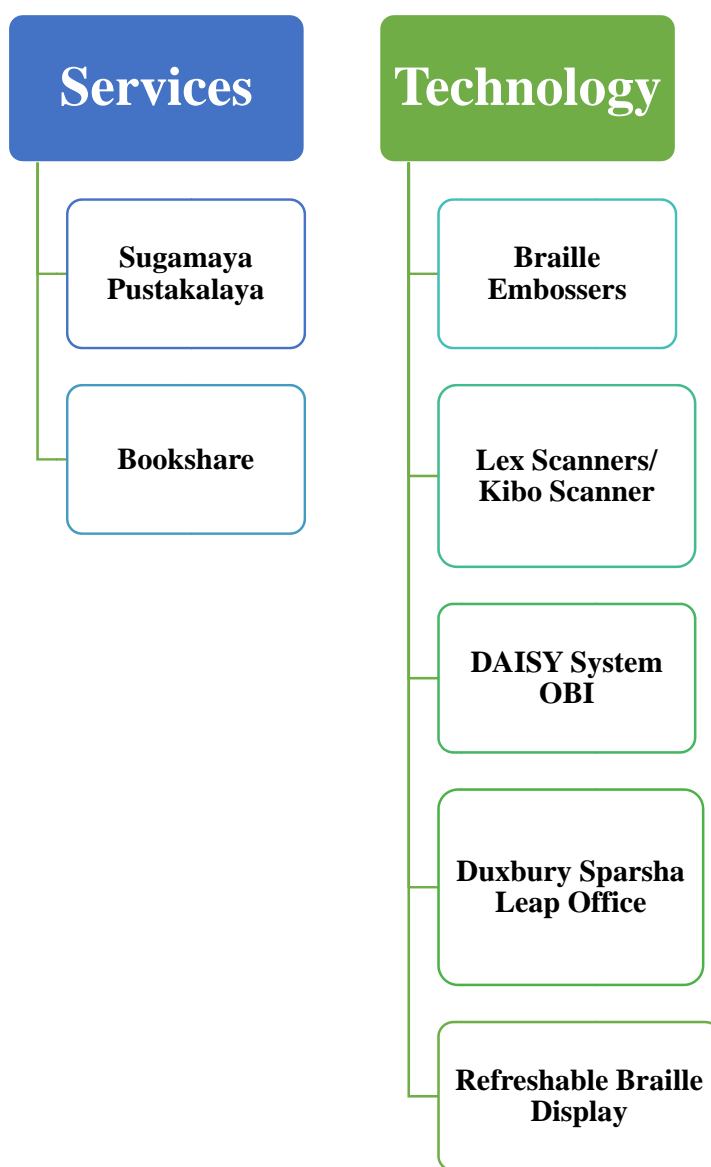
#### 4.1.6 E-Resource Management Software

With 250 GB of dedicated space, CORAL supports centralized management and decision-making for digital resource investments.

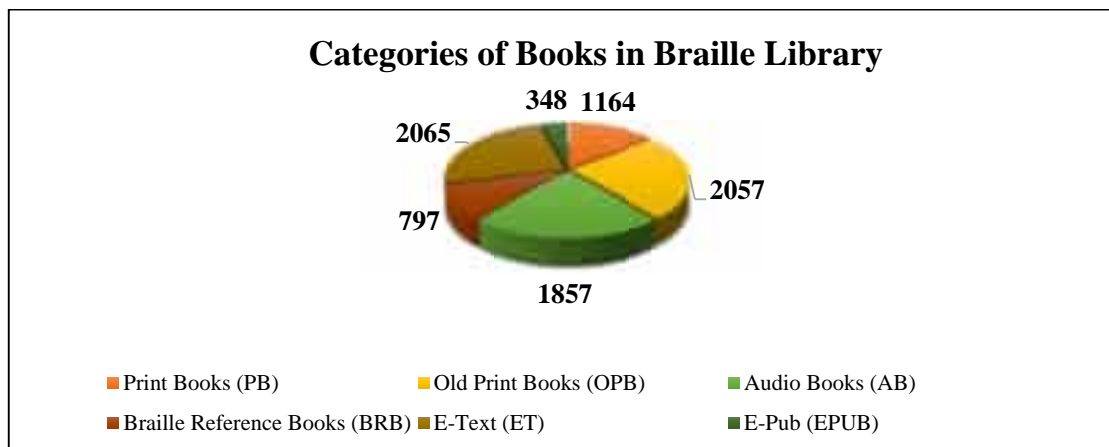

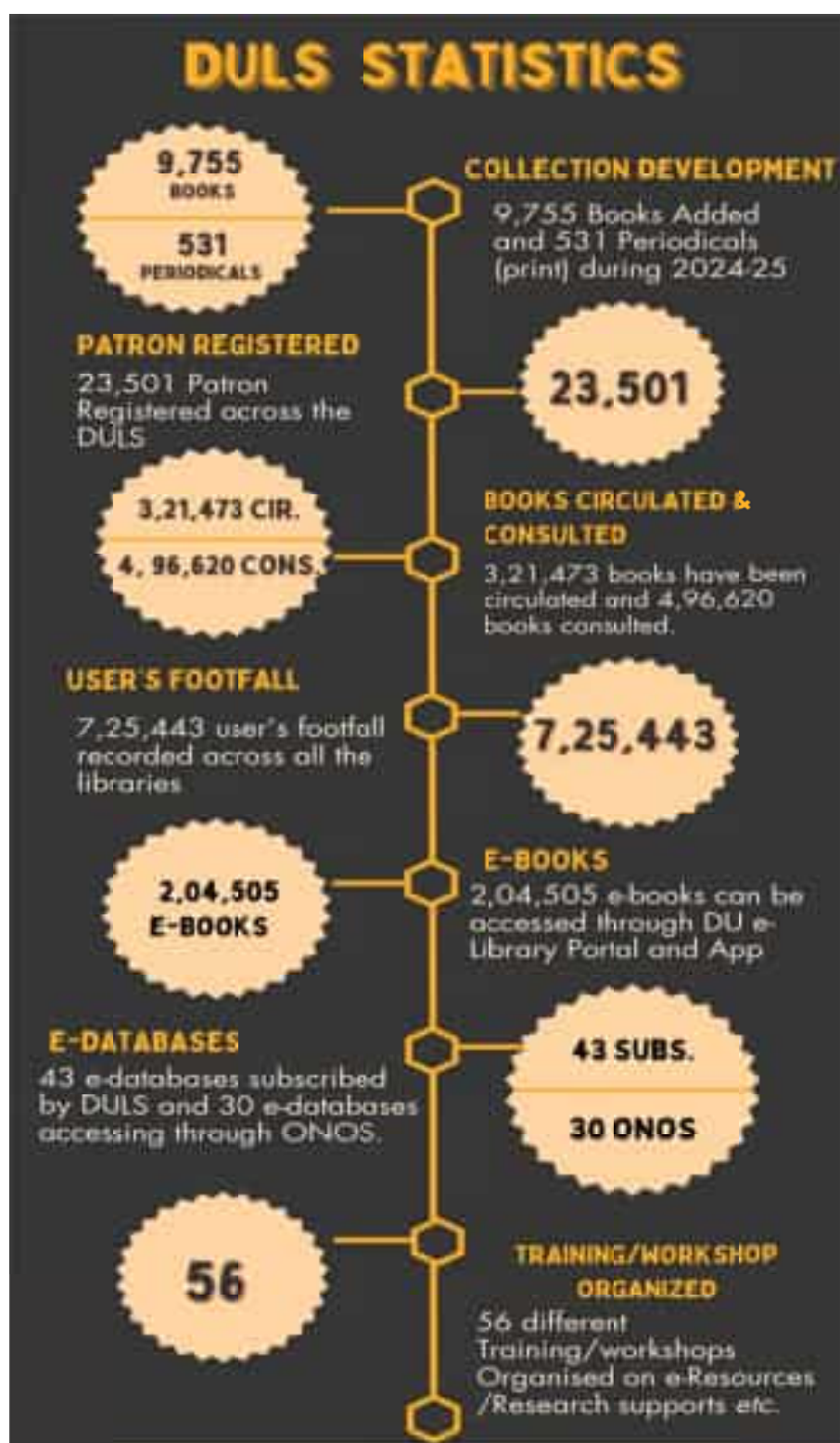
## 5. Collection Development

The Delhi University Library System (DULS) has made remarkable progress in expanding its collection, adding 9,755 new volumes of books through the Capital Assets Budget. As of March 31, 2025, the total number of books in the DULS collection stands at a remarkable 17,35,082 volumes. In addition to this, DULS subscribes to 531 print periodicals, with subscriptions renewed annually through the maintenance grant. The library also maintains an extensive and meticulously organized repository of 50,146 theses and dissertations, providing invaluable resources for research and academic development.

DULS is also committed to enhancing access to electronic resources for the university community. Over the last year, the library added 59,186 e-books, bringing the total e-book collection to an impressive 2,04,505. Furthermore, the library subscribes to 87 e-journals across various disciplines, while also providing access to 44 digital archives and 43 online databases. These resources cover a wide array of subjects and fields, ensuring that students and faculty have access to up-to-date and comprehensive information (Annexure I enclosed).

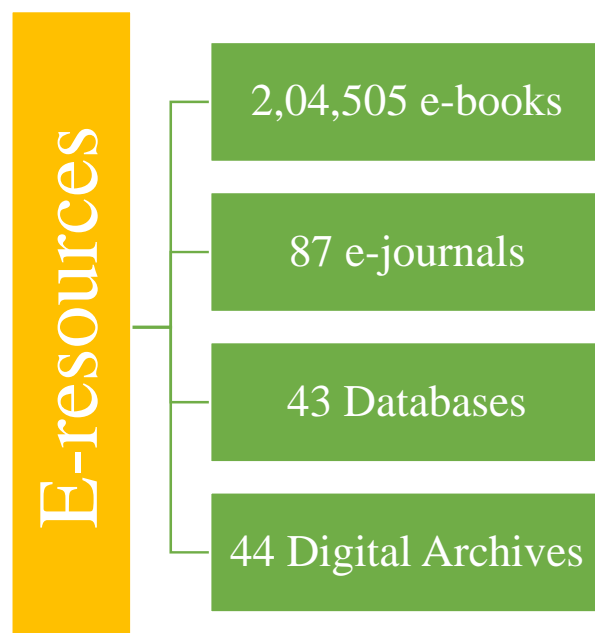


## DULS STATISTICS AT GLANCE

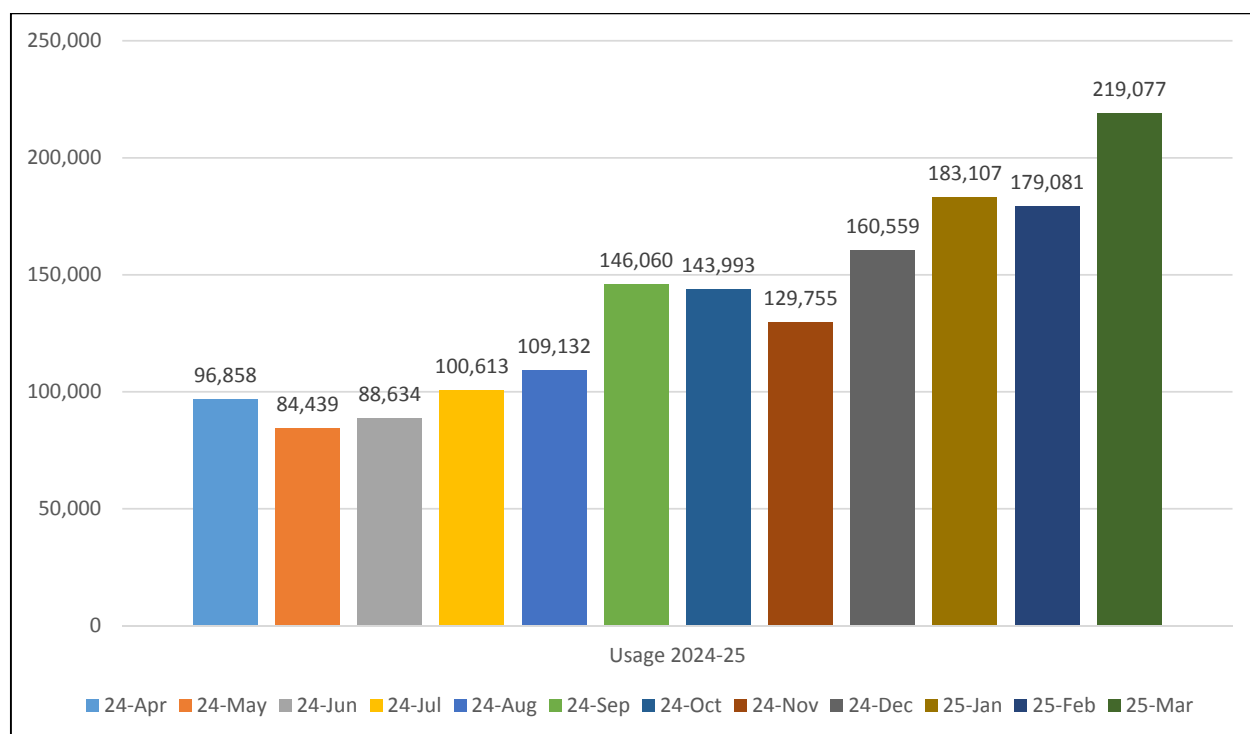

## E-RESOURCES SUBSCRIBED BY DULS



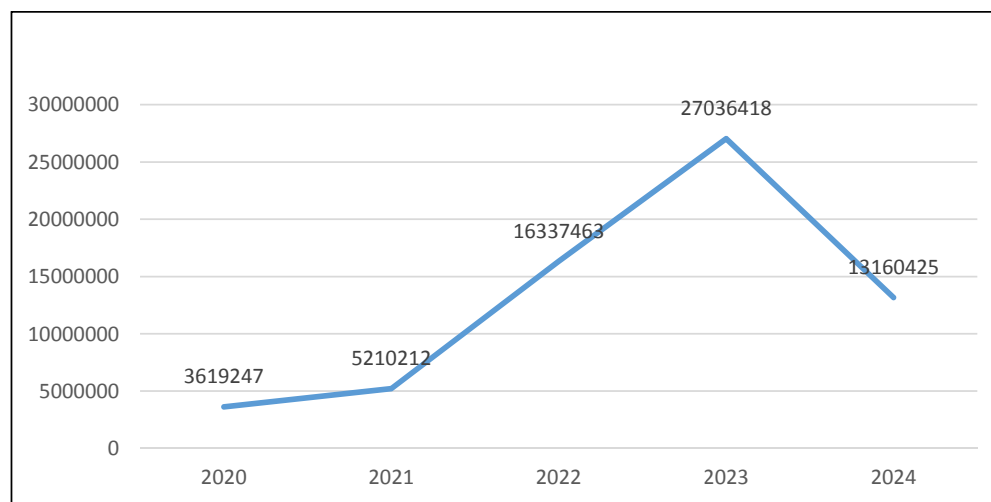
## E-BOOKS USAGE\*

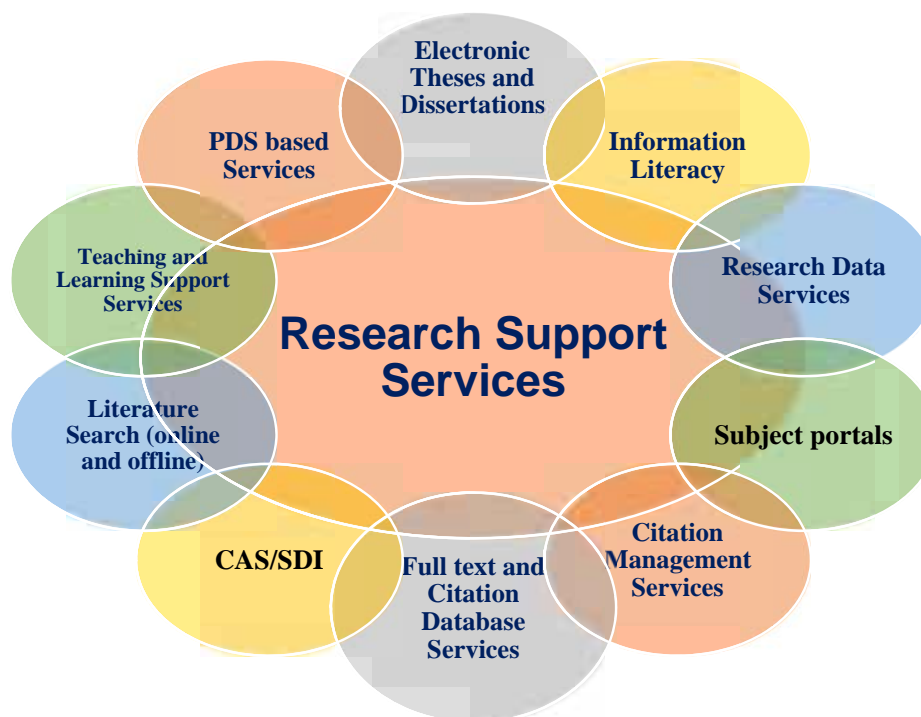


## DATABASE USAGE\*

## 6. Research Support Services



The Delhi University Library System (DULS) offers a wide range of research support services that empower faculty members, researchers, and students in their academic and scholarly endeavours.

These facilities aim to promote research excellence, maintain academic integrity, and streamline research workflows.

## 6.1 Subject Portals

DULS provides **Subject Portals for 27 disciplines**, giving access to curated academic resources, databases, journals, and research materials specific to each field. These portals are essential tools for focused and efficient subject-based research.

## 6.2 Plagiarism Detection Tools

To ensure originality in academic writing and uphold ethical standards, DULS is continuing the work of similarity detection for the research assignment, theses and dissertations with the help following plagiarism detection tools:

### a. Turnitin

Turnitin is a trusted tool for checking the originality of academic content. It helps researchers and students ensure that their work is free from unintentional plagiarism. Turnitin offers detailed similarity reports, enabling users to identify and address problematic sections before submission.

#### **b. Drillbit**

Drillbit is a sophisticated plagiarism detection software that uses advanced algorithms to identify even the most complex instances of content duplication. It is provided through the ShodhShuddhi Programme under the INFLIBNET Centre, supporting academic integrity across Higher Education Institutions.

- **During the year 2024-2025 the DULS have carried out 4719 plagiarism checks.**

### **6.3 Reference Management Tools**

Efficient reference and citation management is crucial for quality research. DULS supports the use of the following tools:

#### **a. Mendeley**

Mendeley helps researchers manage their references and research papers. It allows users to organize and annotate documents, search and sort academic materials, cite sources while writing, collaborate and share references with peers, *etc.* Mendeley is available as a desktop application, browser extension, and word processor plug-in.

#### **b. Zotero**

Zotero is a free, open source tool that helps users collect, organize, cite, and share research sources. It supports a wide variety of formats including online journal articles, books, websites, and more. Zotero simplifies the process of creating citations and bibliographies automatically.
